CITY COUNCIL MEETING
DECEMBER 19, 2022

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The Council of the City of Sedalia, Missouri duly met on Monday, December 19, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. at the Municipal Building in the Council Chambers with Mayor Andrew L. Dawson presiding. Mayor Dawson called the meeting to order and asked for a moment of prayer led by Councilwoman Tina Boggess followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Meeting – FY 2023-2024 Strategic Plan & Budget

Mayor Dawson called the Public Meeting to order. This time has been set aside for input from citizens on items they would like to see the City Council consider in the 2023/2024 Budget. With no public comments, the Public Meeting closed.

Public Hearing – George R. Smith College Site Designation

Mayor Dawson opened the Public Hearing. Community Development Director John Simmons, stated that the Historic Preservation Commission and Planning & Zoning Commission recommend approval of the landmark designation status for the George R. Smith College site. The landmark will be located at Saline and Pettis where they meet and bend near the Railroad spur and a sign and bench will be placed at the site. Community Development Director Simmons read a testimony from Rhonda Chalfant in support of the landmark:

As an historian who has studied Sedalia History including the history of its Black Community, I heartily endorse the plans by the City Council to place a historic marker at the site of George R. Smith College. Established by the Freedmen's Bureau of the Methodist Episcopal Church, North, and established on land given by Sarah Smith-Cotton and Martha Smith and named in honor of their father, Sedalia founder George R. Smith, the college was important to both Sedalia's Black and white citizens during the time of its existence in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The college drew students from across the state and beyond to Sedalia to attend college. It advertised in newspapers across the state that it offered prospective Black students the opportunity to have a college education in a variety of academic fields and that they could work to pay for their education. It placed press releases about its activities in the newspapers of towns from which students came, making sure their readers knew of the college and of Sedalia. The college educated teachers, ministers, business people, scholars, musicians, and a variety of tradespeople. Its sports teams were winners; one of its athletes moved on to play baseball in the Negro Leagues, again bringing recognition to Sedalia. The students and faculty supported the local economy when they came into town to make purchases at the local stores. Its faculty members paid local taxes. It was supported by the local Methodist Episcopal Church, North (now First United Methodist Church), one of whose members helped students plant trees on its campus. When the college burned, local churches and residents of both the Black and white communities implored the ME Church, North, to rebuild the college. Its loss was a blow to Sedalia, particularly to the Black students and prospective students. The college should be honored with a marker noting its location and recognizing its importance to Sedalia, and the important role it played in Black education. Thank you for your consideration.

PUBLIC SAFETY – Jack Robinson, Chairman; Steve Bloess, Vice Chairman

Presentation – Sedalia-Pettis County Emergency Management Agency

Trisha Rooda, Director, Sedalia-Pettis County Emergency Management Agency, defined Emergency Management as a coordinated effort involving local, state, and federal government agencies as well as businesses and volunteer organizations that assist citizens in preparation, response, recovery and minimize effects of not just weather related but all disasters and emergencies. Emergency Management Goals include prevention of injuries, saving lives and reduction in property damage. It is recommended to establish emergency plans, conduct training and hold tabletop exercises.

EMA visits facilities and conducts walk throughs to develop emergency disaster preparedness and plans and have conducted active shooter and tornado table top exercises with various local entities. ChemPack Plan for Region A was developed for “secret container” with hazards for first responders. Updates have also been made regarding the New Madrid Seismic Zone Respite Plan for Earthquakes in coordination with SEMA. Pettis County is a respite site at the Missouri State Fair Grounds for the first 72 hours. People receive necessary services and then are re-disbursed to other locations throughout the State. A \$1,000 Grant was awarded to EMA from Walmart for the purchase of 44 NOAA Weather radios and batteries. The Emergency Management Performance Grant is Federal Funds given to each State by FEMA and is a 50/50 match. It is getting more challenging to obtain and there are requirements to meet to qualify for the Grant.

Expenses for 2020 and 2021 were reviewed. In 2020, EMA had a lot of siren maintenance and replacement of batteries and 2021 expenses were lower related to COVID, travel, and meetings being conducted virtually. Budget Estimates for 2023 reflect an overall EMA Budget of approximately \$169,412.66 with estimated Grant coverage of \$68,945.97. The estimated Budget for Sedalia is \$36,591.55 with large projects being forecast.

Projects/Additional Plans

- **Deputy Director Position** – move from part-time to full-time hourly position with full benefits (start July 2023)
- **CommandOne Program** – Cloud based program for county sirens starting 2023; enables sirens to be activated via National Weather Service alerts automatically and only for towns in the warning; covered under County ARPA grant for 2 years (\$19,000); annual maintenance fee to keep program operational.

- **New Madrid Seismic Zone Emergency Respite Plan** – Review and update work ongoing; updating all memorandums of understanding to withstand on own for 72 hours; working with SEMA and planning full scale exercise in 2024.
- **Hazard Mitigation Plan** – update due in 2024.
- **Region A Chempack** – Tabletop exercise in January; full scale exercise in June.
- **Pettis County Healthcare Coalition Transportation Plan** – Tabletop exercise in April; full scale exercise in July.
- **Rural Region A Committee** – Coordinate with State Vet to develop tabletop exercise over an animal disease hitting a rural community.
- **Start a Community Organization Active in Disaster** – Prepares volunteers to respond to local disasters.
- **National Weather Service outside events training for the Community.**
- **New Radios for storm spotter volunteers** to fix interference radios have with storm shelter door frequency.
- **EMA booth** at the Missouri State Fair.

Strategic Planning Presentation – Police Department

Police Chief Matt Wirt, gave an overview of Police Department operations and goals. Department services include police, community services, and training. New this year are a School Resource Officer at Smith-Cotton Junior High and a Special Response Team. There have been 32,181 calls for service which include 1,712 arrests, 7,000 traffic stops and 600-700 Accidents. The Department is involved with 4th of July, Halloween, Thanksgiving eve events and increased social media presence. Their newest event was a Drone Art contest in area Elementary Schools.

Special Response Team training is a week-long training that every member must attend with 8 hours a month required as team training. This is to equip officers with the tools necessary to respond to situations with a focus on violent incidents. The State has a team but response time to Sedalia is 2-5 hours. With locally trained personnel, the response time goal is under 1 hour. The Department is also working on updating physical skills training for all officers. Gracile Survival Tactic training has been incorporated and is based on Gracile Jujitsu. This technique teaches ways to subdue individuals, particularly if they are larger/stronger. Minimum In-Service training remains at 56 hours. CIT Training continues to be 40 hours and Regional Police training is also conducted.

Strategic Planning:

- **Special Response Team:** Provide advanced training for Special Response Team members; acquire specialized equipment for all types of situations; develop long-term strategies and equipment maintenance/replacement plan; Specialized vehicle.
- **Police:** Provide highly competitive employee package for officers; continue hiring incentive program or paying for police academy; people are greatest asset and work to solve community problems; continue programs that provide for career growth.
- **Community Services & Engagement:** Engage community to solve problems through Problem Oriented Policing; public engagements with positive learning experiences and online presence; understand role of police within the community.

- **Technology & Equipment:** Replace body Worn Cameras; current cameras reaching end of life and no longer supported; maintaining quality cameras increases use and reliability; new generation offers longer run time and battery life.
- **Future:** Focus on recruitment and retention with valuing personnel; establish positive community relationships while solving problems; fully implement Special Response Team operations.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION – Chris Marshall, Chairman; Jack Robinson, Vice Chairman

Financial Update: Finance Director Jessica Pyle, stated that Sales and Use Taxes are lower than October last year. Overall the City is 6% or \$750,000 over last year and \$250,000.00 ahead of budget. Gas tax continues to trend higher reaching a Fiscal Year to date increase of just under 20% offset by vehicle taxes, which is a decrease over last year of 8%. Together they make up the difference in Transportation tax at 5%. Property taxes will be recorded in December and January.

Strategic Planning Presentation – Water Division

Public Works Director Brenda Ardrey stated Year to date, the Water Division has provided 920,000,000 gallons of drinking water to customers. Other duties of the Water Department include maintaining fire hydrants, monitor compliance of sprinkler accounts and backflow preventers. A review of current staff reflected an improvement however, they remain a full dig crew down. Employees from Wastewater and Sanitation have been able to assist in coverage but 3 additional operators are needed. The Water Division will also be requesting short-term assistance with Lead Service Line work for 2023-2024 staffing.

Capital Improvements Facilities: Lightening arrestors for Wells #11 and #12; High Service Pump #3 replacement and VFD installation; Cameras for AWIA Compliance; Generator and fencing for Well #14; Towers being inspected – Maintenance may be required; Modifications to Well #9 from Well Analysis – drop in production from 9,000 gallons/day to between 5,000 to 7,000 gallons/day.

Vehicles and Equipment: Coin and Card Bulk Water Dispenser (**\$45,000**); 2 Trucks – 1 Service Technician, 1 Senior Operation Technician; Share cost of new Vacuum Truck with Wastewater to be able to Hydro/Excavate (**\$275,000**); Mini-excavator and trailer; Refurbish 1988 Crane Truck – low mileage, hydraulics and winch need repaired; Benchtop Turbidimeter and Ph Machine; Snow Plow attachment for Skid Steer.

Construction Only: South Grand Water Main Replacement – West 24th to South City Limits

In FY 2024, American Water Infrastructure Act Lead Line Replacement will be required. The City will have to inventory service lines in all residences, businesses or other commercial structures by October 16, 2024. Following the inventory, the City will have to develop a plan for replacement and have all lead service lines replaced by October 16, 2034. Public Works Director Ardrey estimates that 5,000 to 6,000 customers will be impacted. Staff will be required to look at lines placed in homes prior to 1986.

The Water Filtration Plant has not been out of service due to flooding. In June 2022, access to the plant was by boat due to flash flooding and there has never been an incursion into the physical plant. The flood gates at the plant are sufficient to handle a rise of two feet past the 1993 flood level which was the highest since it's inception. The largest risk of failure at the Water Filtration Plant is electrical failure. There are four external wells to carry through any loss of electrical with the exception of the 10 days of the Missouri State Fair. In the event of tornado, the concern is loss of electricity or a fractured tower. Earthquake is the largest concern related to extensive underground damage and would require the most personnel.

- The Ordinance Authorizes amendments to State Block Grants for the Sedalia Regional Airport. The 2022 allocation will be used to extend the agreement on the auxiliary runway to continue the planning phases along with the Box Hanger project.


Mayor Dawson stated that Paul Bennett, with American Legion Post #642, recently passed away and added that he was an integral part of planning events and will be missed.


